Notes About Dickens & Oliver Twist

"Once upon a time" a young 12 year old boy, by the name of Charles Dickens, had to work in a blackening factory affixing labels to jars of shoe polish to pay off the debt that had landed his father in jail. This chapter of his life would influence him, later as an author and editor, to craft such a story that would reveal "to thousands born and bred in the same city, whose palaces overshadow their cellars--[that] one half of mankind lives without knowing how the other half dies".

Oliver Twist!

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His tale opens not in the factory he knew, but instead the Workhouse system created in 1834 to provide aid and assistance to the impoverished. This new system had serious flaws: the food provided was meager, meals were eaten in silence, and families were separated. This foul treatment broke the spirit of many of the people forced to live there: the poor, the elderly, and the orphans of London and Great Britain.

Dickens would use the journey of young Oliver to be a tour guide to the "unknown" parts of London, tactfully and descriptively allowing his readers to see how over half of the world at the time lived: hungry and fighting to survive. He didn't turn back from presenting a glimpse at lives and themes that some of his contemporaries considered "odious". He even included "a rich sampling of life experiences--from birth and childhood to death," and a selection of occupations and daily life from the law-abiding, the criminal and even the lowly.

It is said that "[Dickens] continued, for the rest of his life, to attack the [law that created the workhouses] as harsh, ill-conceived and l'Il-administered". Later the workhouses would be replaced "by a diversity of institutions--orphanages, hospitals, mental hospitals, old people's homes, and unemployment offices." Who knows what our world would be like today had this one story never been written, read, performed, shared, and in turn impacted his generation and every one thereafter.

Dickens is quoted in stating that he "wished to show, in Little Oliver, the principle of Good surviving through every adverse circumstance, and triumphing at last." And we hope that as you, dear audience, enjoy our labors, and that of Mr. Dickens, you can receive the comfort and very moral he wished to pass on.
